I hope and believe that the new coaches for the UAF men's and women's teams are going to breathe new life into the basketball programs. Before the game I happily wrote down the slogans visible in the gym. "Welcome to Mr. Roderick's Neighborhood." "See Our

Stuff." "The Goudge and Runge Show." "The New Era."

I liked the painted faces. I liked the strip-tease satire and pie-eating contests at halftime. I liked the fans cheering for their young team.
